

Brief exposé

"Of what value is my Soul to me?", the young fisherman asks himself in the fairy-tale story by Oscar Wilde (1891). "I cannot see it. I may not touch it. I do not know it."

As a "soulful person" it is not possible for him to live his love for a mermaid. Therefore, he strives to get rid of his soul. This is the beginning of a breath-taking, exciting story in which the young fisherman and his soul embark on a daring adventure.

The audience is led on a rapid ascent and descent of emotions — on the one hand by the narrative — spoken by narrator Derrick Jenkins — and on the other hand by the music — performed by the four musicians of the Ensemble Tirant d'Eau. Jewels of the romantic genre are integrated and intertwined in the narrative with rarely-heard pieces by composers such as Gaubert, Dvorak, Chausson, Caplet, Ponchielli, Debussy, Poulenc, Ravel, to name just a few.

Like balm for the soul, the emotionally charged melodies trickle into the hearts of the listeners, like a swaying sound colour, and thus open up the possibility to pause and reflect on the spoken word.

The Ensemble Tirant d'Eau

An unusual formation at first glance –



Short biography: Oscar Wilde

Oscar Wilde was born in Dublin in 1854. At the age of 20 he started to study classical literature in Oxford. In 1879 Oscar Wilde moved to London, where he found his way into society as a snobbly-malevolent dandy due to his extravagant lifestyle. He became known for stories such as "The Canterville Ghost"(1887) or the novel "The Portrait of Dorian Gray" (1890).

The performance of his tradegy "Salomé", which Richard Strauss later set to music, was prohibited in London in 1892. As a playwright Oscar Wilde made his breakthrough with "Bunbury" in 1895. But in the same year he was socially and financially ruined by a legal dispute, since he had a homo-sexual relationship with the sixteen year younger Lord Alfred Bruce Douglas since 1891.

His was charged with "sodomy" and sentenced to two years in prison. On the day of his release, he traveled to France under a false name ("Sebastian Melmoth"). On November 30, 1900 Oscar Wilde died impoverished.

The mezzosoproano/soprano sfogato Ilona Waidosch graduated at the Musikhochschule Stuttgart, Germany, with a masters degree in piano and voice.

She attended Master classes and studies in New York (with Charles Kellis, Juilliard; Kamal Khan, MET; Gait Sirguey, Manhattan School of Music) and London (with Glenn Winslade and Peter Robinson) followed by concert tours followed in Geneve, Lausanne, Prague, Chicago, Gaza, Germany, Israel, Japan and Italy.

Her artistic foci are with Verdi, Wagner and the French repertoire.

She lives in Italy and Germany, working as an international freelance singer.

Flauto Dolce

Studied the recorder flute with Professor Dr. Hartmut Strebel in Stuttgart and attended various master classes including with Martin Linde, Switzerland, Professor Markus Zahnhausen, München.

She has discovered the romantic genre for herself with modern recorder flutes and is experimenting with various registers to bring the special sound of the simple woodwind instrument to bloom.

Studied saxophone in Stuttgart with Professor Bernd Konrad. With the "Berliner Saxophon Quartett" he produced various CD-, radio- and TV productions, as well as going on tours abroad e.g. through the US.

He has been a saxophone teacher at SMTT Sindelfingen since 1990. In addition to conducting with the "Musikverein Magstadt", he plays in several ensembles such as "SAXAKKORD" and "SaxOrgel".

He is also a freelance saxophonist and clarinetist in all music genres.

Pianoforte

Studied organ at the Stuttgarter Musikhochschule Orgel with Jon Laukvik. He also studied conducting, musical composition, rhythm and musicology.

In addition to his concert activities as an organist and conductor, he is known for many radio and sound recordings as well as for his compositional work, especially in the field of theatre and cabaret (e.g. for Frieder Nögge, Stuttgart).
